Read through the text and answer the following questions.

1. Where could Mopsy, Flopsy, Cotton-tail and Peter play while Mrs Rabbit went to the bakers?
2. Whose garden were they told not to play in?
3. What did Mrs Rabbit buy from the bakers?
4. What clue tells us that Mrs Rabbit thought it might rain that day?
5. What season do you think it is: spring, summer, autumn or winter?
6. Why?

Wednesday 3rd June

Use your text and answer the questions below.

1. Did Peter find it easy or difficult to get in to Mr McGregor's garden?
2. What do you think really happened to Mr Rabbit?
3. Do you think Peter will run in to trouble when he enters Mr McGregor's garden?
4. Why?
5. Why do you think Mrs Rabbit buys five currant buns?

Thursday 4th June

Use your text and answer the questions below.

1. Why do you think the last line ends with an exclamation mark?
2. Do you think Beatrix Potter meant this story to be read to younger or older children?
3. Why?
4. How does the start of this tale also suggest this?
5. What do you like/dislike about this text and why?
